# CHARTER

# VISION STATEMENT

## (June 2005)

In the year 2025, Shenandoah County will be a primarily rural community that:

- Protects its natural resources
- Directs its growth to the towns, ensuring it open agricultural character
- Provides a variety of jobs in business, light industry, tourism and sustainable agriculture

# VISION STATEMENT (cont.)

- Maintains moderate growth of a demographically varied population
- Supports safe and efficient interstate transportation and maintains the rural character of its primary and secondary roads
- Affords its students excellent and appropriate education

# VISION STATEMENT (cont.)

- Serves its citizens with public facilities and services that enhance their quality of life
- Ensures preservation of its natural beauty and unique, historical character by strictly adhering to the goals and objectives of the Comprehensive Plan


# SCHOOL EXPENDITURES

2007 – 2008	6160	\$8886	+ 4.1%

# STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS

- 59% of high school graduates received advanced studies diplomas in June 2007
- 80% of graduates attend institutions of higher education (4-year colleges, 2-year colleges, and technical schools)

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- January 23<sup>rd</sup>, joined Shenandoah Valley Partnership
- October 23<sup>rd</sup>, approved matching funds for IAC
- North Shenandoah Business Industrial Park
  - Phase I access road, 2 new facilities under roof
- Route 11 Potato Chips – Mt. Jackson
- Shenandoah County Chamber advisory group monthly meeting
- Value of tourism revenue in excess of \$150M

# ACTIONS OF PC & BOS

- The CAC Reviewed more than 200 Actions taken by the Board of Supervisors in 2007.
- Actions were generally found to be in compliance with the Comprehensive Plan

# Notable Actions

- January 9<sup>th</sup>, denial of 99 acre boundary line adjustment with New Market
- March 17<sup>th</sup> deeding Fisher's Hill property to Battlefields Foundation
- April 24<sup>th</sup> limitation on height of structures
- May 8<sup>th</sup> continued support of regional water supply plan

# Notable Actions (cont.)

- May 21<sup>st</sup> hosted Dr. Michael Chandler – discussion regarding the role of the Comprehensive Plan
- June 12<sup>th</sup> approved RFP for architectural services for Alms House
- June 26<sup>th</sup> approved Open Space Ordinance – limited to Public Service Areas
- August 14<sup>th</sup> approved engineering study for North Fork Plant

# Notable Actions (cont.)

- October 9<sup>th</sup> approved a letter to VDOT asking to hold off proceeding with Tier II – I-81 proposal
- October 23<sup>rd</sup> resolution of support for Battlefields Foundation T-21 grant
- November 14<sup>th</sup> formed task force for Alms House
- November 14<sup>th</sup> adopted PDR Ordinance

# Implementation Chapter items addressed in 2007

- Public hearing held on septic pump-out ordinance, engineering to occur for North Fork Plant
- Open Space Ordinance adopted – limited to Public Svc. Areas
- PDR Ordinance adopted
- Joining Shenandoah Valley Partnership
- OVP Corridor Plan almost finished

# CAC Goals for 2008

Participate with Planning Commission and Planning Staff to produce Comprehensive Plan recommendations.
